Internships

Hulbert Outdoor Center Leadership Program

The week-long seminar at Hulbert Outdoor Center in Fairlee, VT, provides opportunities to test each student's limits, learn what coping skills work and don't work for success as an individual, and to learn effective strategies for working as part of a group. LEARNING CENTER

Academic Afterschool

Academic Afterschool provides additional assistance and academic support to students who need more help completing assignments during the school week. The 1 teacher to 5 student ratio provides an intimate setting where students can focus on their work and successfully complete assignments.
